

IRVIN HIGH SCHOOL HISTORY

Irvin High School opened in September of 1959. It was named in honor of Dr. O.C. Irvin, Dr. E.H. Irvin, and Mr. C.M. Irvin. All three of these gentlemen made great contributions to the El Paso School Board, and their combined efforts spanned a 76 year time period.

In 1882, Dr. O. C. Irvin was chosen to be the secretary of the first school board in El Paso. He saw the building of the first El Paso school. Before Dr. Irvin's term expired, his dream of a good high school came to fruition when a new school building, which included high school facilities, was opened on Montana Street at the present site of the YMCA building.

Dr. E. H. Irvin was a physician in El Paso. He served on the school board during the years 1910-1913 and was president during 1912 and 1913. Dr. E.H. Irvin made El Paso High School a reality to help El Paso's overwhelming growth problems when a four block site was chosen in the Alexander Addition for a new high school.

Mr. C. M. Irvin was a native El Pasoan who graduated from El Paso High School in 1921. He served as a member and president of the El Paso Chamber of Commerce and the Sun Carnival Association, and was the president of the school board from 1955 through April 8, 1958, when he retired.

At the time of Irvin's opening, Mr. H. E. Charles was the Superintendent of El Paso Public Schools. Mr. Cecil S. Bean was Irvin's first principal, and Mr. Boyd Caffey was the first assistant principal.

The rocket was chosen as the school's mascot because of Irvin High's close affiliation with the military. On that same line, the patriotic colors of red, white, and blue were chosen by the coaches and school board to represent Irvin pride.

IRVIN HIGH SCHOOL HISTORY

At its opening, Irvin held classes for grades 7 through 12. In the fall of 1960, the seventh graders were no longer a part of the student body.

The first person to graduate from Irvin was Janice Burchfield Brooks. Her graduation ceremony took place on January 21, 1960, and there has never been a mid-year graduation ceremony since.

The first President of the student body was Greg Rystad ('59 - '60). The Queen of Irvin's first Homecoming in October 1960 was Joyce Dickson ('61). The National Honor Society has been an integral part of student life from almost the beginning of Irvin's existence, the first induction being in 1961.

The Observer, the school newspaper, and the Orbit, Irvin's yearbook, were both started in 1960. Lynn Shirley wrote the Fight Song in 1961 and graduated with the class of '63.

The class of '61 was an energetic group which started the school year with business and continued doing things until graduation. The first Senior Meeting was for the purpose of selecting representatives to the Student Council while the second regarded ordering senior rings. The Sadie Hawkins Dance, which netted \$142 was the first major project followed by the Blue Christmas Dance. The Senior Follies production was a very successful and entertaining endeavor, which was presented three times. The Senior Play, "The Curious Savage," was also well received. The senior trip (remember the tasty oranges!), the dedication of the senior gift to Irvin, the senior banquet, prom and graduation were sparkling memorable events that rounded out a great senior year.

The first Irvin-in-Orbit pageant and coronation ball was in the spring of 1962; Cindy Elmore was the first queen. Over the years the pageant and dance has been held in the Irvin Main Gym, the Hilton Inn, the Top of the Inn Holiday Inn, the El Maida Shrine Temple, the Fiesta Hall, the Vista Del Sol Hall, and in more recent years the Centennial Club on Fort Bliss and the Camino Real Downtown.

The Alma Mater was written in 1965 by a member of the class of '66, Fred Moon. This song is sometimes played at Irvin's graduations.





Walt Johnson '60

At the time of his passing on 3 February 1987, Walt was the Director of the Genetics Center at Case Western Reserve University and University Hospitals, a post he was named to in 1984. At this time, he was also Director of the Cytogenetics (pertaining to cells and genetics) Laboratory at CWRU as well as Director of the Vitro Fertilization Laboratory at McDonald Hospital for Women.

Walt received a PhD in evolutionary genetics in 1970 from the University of Texas. He began his career at CWRU in 1976 with a post doctoral fellowship in human genetics and clinical cytogenetics and was named Assistant Professor of medicine the next year. In 1984, he was appointed assistant professor of pediatrics.

Under his direction, CWRU's genetics laboratories grew to the largest provider of prenatal diagnostic services in Ohio. Walt was Chairman of the Ohio Cytogenetics Task Force of the Southeast Cancer Study Group. He was board certified in clinical cytogenetics and medical genetics by the American Board of Medical Genetics. His work was published in numerous medical journals.



A Tribute to Wes Maxwell by Dave Roen

In 1970, I had decided an Air Force career was not for me and was considering my options. In addition to vet school, teaching was a possibility. I called my old friend Wes Maxwell who had become a teacher.

When I told Wes what I had in mind, he said, “Dave, I don’t know how bad the Air Force is, but I can guarantee you teaching is worse.” He was teaching Junior High in a particularly tough section of El Paso and I happened to call shortly after a parent had challenged him to a fistfight and some students had set his car on fire in the parking lot. Wes said he had applied for Veterinary School.

I had known Wes in High School and came to know him well while we were undergraduates at Texas Western College in El Paso. He was always up to something. He organized hiking trips up into the desert mountains exploring old mine shafts. He and two friends scraped up money to take scuba diving lessons, then rode a rickety old school bus all the way across Mexico to dive off the coast near Cancun. He recruited another friend and I to go down to the Big Ben National Park on the Texas Rio Grande and float through the deep canyons on old rubber air mattresses. He talked me into skydiving back when the sport was primitive, unorganized, cheap, and considerably more dangerous than it is now. He came bull riding with me on the agreement that I would get out on the judo mat with him. I have to admit, I reneged. Wes was the Texas State Judo Champion and had studied in Japan at the Kodokan. He helped me get part time jobs and showed me how to stop flunking so many classes and still party and have adventures.

When he was not accepted to vet school the first time, he quit his teaching job and moved with his wife to College Station where the vet school was. By the time I got out of the service and started taking pre-vet courses at Texas A&M, he had made some excellent grades as a graduate student there and learned all the insider secrets to getting accepted to vet school. He gladly shared what he knew with me even though we would be competing (with five or six hundred others) for one of the 132 openings. I was in El Paso to observe veterinary practice during a school break when my wife called to excitedly tell me I had been accepted to vet school, but her tears of happiness started when she told me our friend Wes had also been accepted.

He helped me get through vet school. Wes could always find something good to point out about you just when you needed a boost. After graduation, Wes and Beth stayed in Texas and we moved here (Clarkston, WA), but we got together at class reunions, visits to Dallas, a salmon fishing trip to Puget Sound, and we celebrated 20th wedding anniversaries together scuba diving in Hawaii. Wes became an avian medicine expert and I called him several times for help when confronted with a sick bird to doctor.

And now I'm just back from his funeral. Their last Christmas card informed us Wes had just been diagnosed with a highly malignant cancer. I'm not sure I would have applied, been accepted, or gotten through vet school without his good humor, enthusiasm, optimism, encouragement, and the example he set for me of persistence. He was the best friend I ever had.

Robert “Bob” C. McGarr ‘60


Robert Charles McGarr was born August 31, 1943 in New York City.

After graduating from Irvin, he served in the U.S. Army in Japan from 1960 to 1963. He worked in Morse Code and Cryptography and had the highest security clearance obtainable. He then worked for the State National Bank of El Paso from 1963 to 1972 and was an Assistant Cashier and Installment Loan Officer.

He attended the University of Houston and received a BBA in Organizational Behavior and Management in 1977. He graduated Cum Laude. After graduation, he worked for Texas Instruments in Houston, Texas as a Supervisor and Leasing Administrator from 1976 to 1978. He also owned several small businesses.

He was President of the El Paso 20-30 International Service Club, a coach for El Paso Boy’s Baseball from 1966 to 1972, Treasurer of the El Paso Rehabilitation Center from 1968-1970, Chairman of the Fund Raising Committee for the March of Dimes in El Paso from 1969 to 1972 and a member of the Executive Committee of the Sun Carnival from 1970 to 1972.

He was married four times and had one son, Lance McGarr. He passed away on November 23, 1992 in Houston, Texas, and is buried in the Houston National Cemetery.





IN MEMORIAM







Ronnie Lee '62






IN MEMORIAM

Ken Scott with his son, Kenny.


IN MEMORIAM

He left Indiana in the early 80's, moving to California to work for a consulting engineering firm in Pasadena. His specialty was training employees for operating newly opened waste water treatment plants. He died in November 1984 at age 40.




Vernon Bolstad

Caroll (Cernaghan) Nesbit





hung it up and retired completely and is very involved in her church and is in charge of a ministry for feeding the homeless.



Walter McCulloch

Walter married his wife, Grace, in January 1981. In November 1981, their son Philip was born. Philip and his wife, Nicole, are parents of a daughter and son.






Linda (Thompson) Harris

FUNNY STORY: Irvin's home games were played at Austin High School, whose football field was enclosed by a chain link fence.






Mike McGarr
